### From the Superintendent

How Do School Districts Decide To Close Schools?

The month of December has arrived and city, county and state road crews have prepared their equipment for winter weather events. As soon as severe weather is predicted, road crews throughout the Midwest begin to pretreat roads with a brine mixture and when a snow event occurs, road crews will be out on the roads throughout the night plowing snow and laying down salt and sand mix to bring the roadway back to a drivable condition. These agencies work very hard to keep the primary hard surface roads open; however, many times gravel and rock roads remain drifted shut, iced over, unsafe and impassable for several days during and after snow and ice storms. Wind with colder temperatures and frost covered ground, combined with rain, thawing, and refreezing are all conditions that school bus drivers have to deal with throughout the winter months. For superintendents and transportation directors, deciding when to run and when to keep the buses parked can be a stressful decision. With the first snow on the ground, it's a good time to take the opportunity to review how decisions are made and then communicated when the weather turns severe. The safety of students is the top priority.

Administrators must use the collected information and their own best judgment to make a decision for what is best for all students. not just the students riding on district school buses. They must factor into the equation the safety of the students that are standing at bus stops, walking to school, inexperienced teenage drivers and district staff members. At times, the decision may not fit with individual circumstances. When schools close, many families have issues with childcare. As a result, districts try to keep schools open if it's safe to do so.

How do districts decide whether or not to close due to snow, ice and extreme cold? Each district tackles this problem basically the same. Superintendents and transportation officials monitor television and radio for storm forecasts and snow predictions from regional meteorologists. For those early morning decisions, officials consult with city and county road crews sometimes before 5:00 a.m. They go out and check the road conditions and talk with their own school maintenance staff, who are out clearing parking lots, sidewalks, bus transfer points and playgrounds,

along with communication with surrounding school districts. The information gained from all of these individuals is crucial in making the best decision possible for the safety of the students. staff and the public in each community.

Closing school for ice, heavy snow or blizzard conditions is easier for the public to understand; however, school officials also have to be prepared for extremely cold days. Most districts close school buildings when temperatures reach a wind chill warning of minus 45 degrees or when the actual temperature reaches negative 25 degrees. These are the toughest for the public to understand. It may be a clear day, but school has been canceled for the safety of the children that are walking to school and waiting at bus stops. They also have to consider that when a school bus or a teenager. parent or staff member's car breaks down in a rural area of the district, help takes more time to get to the stranded individual, increasing the possibility of exposure.

Closing school announcements on some occasions are made with short notice due to weather conditions changing faster than meteorologists forecasted. When possible, school administrators will make earlier notice of school closings, with the most commonly requested notice time being 10 p.m. at night so families have more time to plan. No matter what the superintendent has decided, parents have the final say. If they don't think it's safe enough for their kids to come to school, it is generally recommended that parents make other arrangements. School administrators know that student safety is always their number one priority.



**Federal financial Aid (FAFSA) forms** are available online at <a href="https://www.fafsa.gov">www.fafsa.gov</a>. There is free local 1:1 FAFSA assistance available by calling Val Gonzalez at 456-5668. Additionally great websites for financial aid assistance are <a href="https://www.managingcollegecost.com">www.managingcollegecost.com</a>, which offers video tutorials in more than 30 financial areas, and <a href="https://www.iowacollegeaid.org">www.iowacollegeaid.org</a>.

Senior Scholarships...With graduation a few months away, it's time to really hit the scholarship applications hard. Local Hampton-Dumont Scholarship Fund (HDSF) applications can be found on the guidance page of school fusion. Seniors will complete this application and email it to me (tchristiansen@hdcsd.org). Once this single application is submitted and returned, copies are made and distributed to approximately 50 different scholarship donors to make their selection. Additionally all students who complete the application will receive a guaranteed scholarship from the Foster and Evelyn Barkema Charitable Trust. The deadline to turn in applications is January 31. Senior Awards Night is Wednesday, May 17 at 7 pm. Mark your calendars now.

Remember to check with your college about scholarships they offer. Many of the scholarship applications are on their school websites. For example, ISU offers the Christina Hixson Opportunity Award. This scholarship is worth \$10,000 and is given to one student in EACH IOWA COUNTY. Go to <a href="https://www.iastate.edu">www.iastate.edu</a> to apply.

The local scholarship booklet in my office is a great tool as many state and area scholarships are included, with deadlines are fast approaching. Juniors may also want to look online at a copy of this booklet and use it as a reference in planning for next year.


**Junior Scholarships...**However, juniors also have the opportunity to begin applying for scholarships. Applications are available for the 2014 Herbert Hoover Uncommon Student Award, a \$5,000 scholarship program for lowa high school juniors. Students chosen for the program receive a \$750 stipend. In addition, three \$5,000 scholarships are awarded for post-secondary study.

The award program seeks to identify students during their junior year in high school. Students are <u>NOT</u> evaluated on the basis of grades, test scores, essays, or financial need. Applicants submit a proposal for a goal they want to accomplish. Approximately 15 students are selected each year on the basis of their stated project goal and detailed plans to reach that goal.

### **DARE to Dream**

Tuesday, November 22, was a big day for the fifth graders. That was the day that they officially graduated from D.A.R.E. It was the culmination of ten weeks of instruction by Chief Bob Schaefer. The students learned that D.A.R.E. stands for Define, Assess, Respond, and Evaluate.

The skills that they learned in D.A.R.E. class are skills that can be used in many situations. The four steps represent the D.A.R.E. Decision-Making Model. Students were presented with situations where they had to practice the decision-making model. They learned that it is not always easy to make a good choice when their peers are involved.

The students learned various resistance strategies. They learned that they could avoid the situation, they have strength in numbers, they could walk away, they can say no while giving a reason, and they can change the subject. They would role-play each of these strategies in groups.

D.A.R.E. also taught the students how to look for signs of stress. Then they found activities that help them to alleviate their stress. Chief Schaefer taught them that they need to be confident when they communicate.

They need to make sure that their body language matches what they are saying. One of the final topics was bullying. They were taught how to report bullying and how they can help in various situations.

As fifth grader Paris Wickwire stated," DARE teaches you that you can say no to drugs and smoking. My favorite part was the D.A.R.E. role models."

The D.A.R.E. role models were a big hit with all the fifth graders. The last class session we had four high school students come and talk about their experiences.



Emilio Valenzuela, Meg Christiansen, Ally Hanson, and Max Aalbers were the D.A.R.E. role models who spoke to the fifth graders about how they make decisions. They answered questions from the students about the strategies they use to resist bad situations. The role models ate lunch with the students and went out to recess with them.

The final activity was the graduation. The D.A.R.E. role models were there and Mr. Madson, the high school principal, spoke to the students. Two fifth graders will represent the class at the state convention. Ellianna Ragsdale won the essay contest and Faith Krull won the poster contest. We wish these two well at the state level. Our hope is that the skills the fifth graders have learned in D.A.R.E. class will help them in their decision-making.



## PBIS Coming to North Side & South Side

### Library Update

Both North Side and South Side students in grades K-2 have been conducting animal research. With guidance, students read non-fiction animal books, answered questions, and discussed citations. What is copyright? What is plagiarism? These are big words for young children, yet they know what "right" and "wrong" is, and they clearly understand the importance of showing where they got their information and writing page numbers down, etc. Third graders have been spending their library time using Destiny, locating different types of books, genres, and categories pertaining to each book title. These students have begun to hunt for specific types of books in the library. They have enjoyed a library BINGO and a book hunt game these past several weeks.

Students in grades four and five have been doing very similar work with that of third graders. Fourth graders are getting more and more acquainted to a new library setting since last year, as things are different from South Side Elementary. There is a section in the library called

Books to Movies (BTM's). Students can read popular book titles that are also movie titles. While there are not movies for students to check out per se, they can read the books and compare and contrast the two should they have a chance to watch a movie that is also a book in the middle school library. Students can also take a look at newspapers (The Hampton Chronicle and the Globe Gazette), utilize playaways, and find a new selection of magazines and books. There is so much to learn!



Students in grades sixth through twelfth grade have received or will be receiving soon, instruction on the following topics before Christmas break: research/Ebsco, inter-library loan searching, digital citizenship, and copyright review. ### 3<sup>rd</sup> Grade Physics

A new physics unit, Forces and Motion, is quickly becoming a favorite among third graders. Through investigations they have observed how magnets attract and repel, how gravity always pulls toward the center of the Earth, and how the motion of objects can change when they roll and spin. In learning new concepts students are given a focus question, they make predictions, and complete an investigation. They take notes and sketch what they observe in their science notebooks. Finally, they discuss what they have discovered and answer the focus question. They are very eager

scientists! In one of our investigations every student made a paper "twirly bird" and labeled it as the standard. They tested how it twirled and fell to the ground when standing on a chair and letting it go. They then added an assigned variable and compared it to their standard. One group shortened the wings, the other





group added a paper clip to the stem. Next, students created their own variable, wrote their own focus questions, made predictions, and then studied how the variables changed the twirly birds' flight. They discussed their outcomes with the class.

In the photos below students are comparing their standard twirly birds to the ones that they added a variable to. They learned why it is important to add one variable at a time and have become experts at making predictions and finding answers to their focus questions. Our new science curriculum explains, "It's not so much about being right or wrong, it's about thinking 'Why did that happen?' Sometimes wrong predictions can lead to great discoveries because those surprises prompt scientists to be even more curious about what's going on and to ask more questions." (Foss, Next Generation, University of California, Berkeley)

Our final investigation will give students a chance to design and redesign rolling carts to meet various challenges as they learn about engineering practices. It is very exciting to see our young scientists working together with so much curiosity and enthusiasm!

### **Kindergarten Art**

North Side kindergarten students have been hard at work in art. Students learned all about shapes, contour



drawings, and how to paint with watercolors. To begin, students were taught how to draw a square, circle, and triangle. Each student was given three pieces of paper.



In the middle of each paper students drew one of the shapes. Next, they drew the same shape around it, making sure to make it a little larger. Students continued this process until they had four shapes on their paper. Kindergarten students completed the project by adding watercolor paint to their contour shape drawings. The bright paint really made the shapes pop! Great job, Kindergarten!

Do you realize that here at HD we pay officials roughly \$30 per hour for their efforts (sometimes more). If you're knowledgeable in a sport(s), if you want to be a positive influence for young people, if you want to find a way to get involved or re-involved, if you want to become more active in the community, or if maybe you feel you can just "do better", officiating would be a great avenue for you to pursue.

High school age students can also become certified in lowa. In fact, last winter I had a HS student who could not participate in athletics due to injury so he became a certified wrestling official. We found him a mentor and allowed him to work some of our JH wrestling meets. By season's end he was one of the most sought after JH wresting officials in Western lowa.

# Middle School Language Arts

#### Happenings in 6th Grade Language

Currently our 6th graders are embarking on a journey using Literature Circles to explore and analyze novels that are chosen using their instructional reading level. Each student has been grouped with a small group of students and they are reading a novel together. Besides reading the novel, the students are discussing their literature with each other. Literature circles are a wonderful way to introduce our sixth graders to quality literature and expose them to many different books. Our learning target for sixth graders during literature circles is that each student is able to read and comprehend text using a variety of reading strategies which include; questioning text, connecting to the text, making inferences while reading text, visualizing while reading text, and picking out important vocabulary words within their text.

During writing time, our 6th graders are working on writing personal narratives. The 6th grade language arts teachers have been sharing personal narratives with the students that are written by different authors. Each personal narrative shares either a childhood memory, a life changing event, or a lesson that has been learned about the author. Soon they will be publishing their own personal narratives.

#### Happenings in 7th grade Language

The 7th graders finished up writing a how-to-guide on a topic of their choice right before Thanksgiving and they will soon be writing a research paper relating to a current world topic that is of interest to them.

In 7th grade reading, the students are reading the novel La Linea. La Linea is written by Ann Jaramillo and it is about two teenagers that are trying to reach the United States and reunite with their parents. It is a story about courage, adventure, and the dangers and risks families endure together. This unit works on multiple comprehension strategies to prepare students for the upcoming Black History Month Literature Circle unit.

#### Happenings in 8th grade Language

Eighth grade students are working on a summarizing unit during the reading portion of class. In this unit, students are working on identifying main ideas, supporting details, and finally, summarizing a text. Teachers are providing a lot of extra support for this unit, as it can be difficult to grasp. Guided Reading groups have been implemented into the reading block to allow for individualized, additional instruction on this skill.

During writing time, eighth grade students have been working on their Influential Person research papers. We have been focusing on minilessons surrounded around important research skills such as note taking, paraphrasing, using credible sources, citing sources, and more. After mini-lesson instruction, students are given ample time in class to write, ask questions, and receive conferencing help from peers and teachers. At the end of the unit, students will give a brief presentation over their influential person, in an effort to prepare them for the speech unit that will be coming up in the Spring.

### 7th and 8th Grade Einstein

This year several literacy interventions have been added to our seventh and eighth grade Einstein time. If students have been identified, based on their test scores, as having a specific literacy need, they may be placed in one of the following literacy intervention groups during Einstein time: Fluency practice, Vocabulary practice, or Guided Reading instruction. We are excited about these individualized opportunities for growth!

#### **HOW TO BECOME AN OFFICIAL**

#### QUALIFICATIONS

- . Must be a high school student or older.
- · A thorough understanding of the sport you wish to officiate.
- . The ability to interpret and apply rules.

#### POLICIES

- High school students are eligible to obtain a license and officiate junior high school (7" or 8" graders) contests, but may not officiate senior high (grades 9-12) games (with soccer as an exception).
- An official is required to have a valid IHSAA license to officiate grades 9-12 between member schools in the sports of baseball, basketball, football, cross country, soccer, swimming, wrestling and track and field.
- All officials' licenses expire annually after the state baseball tournament and are renewable for one year, beginning on June 1.
- The required uniform is mandatory for officials working any interscholastic contest between IHSAA member schools. Officials' uniforms may be purchased at The Graphic Edge (1-800-747-9744 or <a href="https://www.thegraphicedge.com">www.thegraphicedge.com</a>), Smitty Officials Apparel, or Honig's Whistle Stop. Refer to the National Federation Rules Book for your sport to determine the specific uniform needs.

#### **EXAMS AND RULES MEETINGS**

- All officials must score 75-percent or above on an online exam in the sport(s) for which they intend to officiate. Exams are available online approximately 1 month prior to the starting date of each sport.
- If you fail that exam, you may retake it two more times. If you fail all three, you must
  wait until the following year to try again. Failing in one sport does not disqualify you
  from officiating another.
- All officials are required to view an online rules interpretation meeting in their sport(s) before the season begins. Rule meetings are available online approximately 1 month prior to the starting date of each sport.
- New officials are required to attend a clinic within the first 3 years of registration in the sports of football, basketball, baseball and wrestling if they want to be varsity eligible.

#### HOW TO REGISTER

- From our website (www.iahsaa.org ), click on OFFICIALS. Once that page opens, click on, Online Registration Form for New and Re-Registered Officials.
- Payment can be made online with a Visa, Mastercard or Discover. Fees include rules books, case books, online exam, online rules meeting, liability insurance, and other publications.
- · Fees-

One sport: \$50
Full-time college student or High school student (one sport): \$20
Each additional sport: \$12

#### ONCE YOU'RE AN OFFICIAL...

- · Directly contact the athletic directors at area schools for game contracts.
- You are strongly encouraged to become a member of a local officials' association where you can receive training, mentoring and assistance in obtaining game contracts.
   A list of associations can be found under the Officials tab of the IHSAA website,
- Member schools set the officiating fees you receive based on the level of competition, distance to and from the contest, number of contests officiated, and number of officials needed to work the game.
